"Soon after Benjamin B. Cooper took over the Cooperstown farm, which he called "Merino Farm," it became the mecca for lovers of blooded horses, Devonshire cattle and merino sheep. ... The old farm after passing through several hands was laid out as a burying ground. Extensive improvements were made in the grounds and a number of lots sold, but when the cemetery association failed to live up to its contracts, the mortgage on the property was foreclosed and all of the bodies removed. In later years, the place came under a cloud on account of the violent death of a negro on the premises and, for a long time, the more superstitious neighbors declared the house was haunted by the ghost of the murdered man. ## The Jeffrey Chew Place

Ivy Chew

Located at or near old Chew's Landing, being an old stone mansion with family graveyard attached, at Clement's Bridge.

History says: "The last encampment of the Hessian troops under Count Dunop, before the battle of Red Bank, was in Haddonfield, which place they left before day light on the morning of October 22, 1777, enroute for Red Bank, by way of the lower bridge (between Gloucester and Westville) over Big Timber Creek, but the American guards, in anticipation of this moment, had already destroyed the bridge, so the Hessians were obliged to march about 4 miles further up-stream and cross by the upper bridge, or Clement's Bridge, and also return by this bridge after their defeat at Red Bank, and death of their commanding officer: so weary and worn were they when they returned to the bridge on their retreat THAT IT IS SAID, they threw into the creek two field pieces to lighten their loads (What a

prize relic they would be today, if found.) for many of them were wounded and some dying.

Old traditions say that the ones who died, while they were resting at the bridge, were buried in the old grave yard [Ashbrooks – Zane – Marple] (now – 1960 – nearly obliterated) along the hillside north-east from the Bridge on the angle where Evesham Road forks with the Woodbury-Chews Landing Road, near the barns and outbuildings of the present farm, to the west of them.

Later traditions confirm the older, by adding that in the early years of the 1800s while digging in the old grave yard at one time, shreds of red cloth were found similar to the uniforms worn by the Hessian soldiers.

Old tradition also claims that American soldiers of the Revolution were buried there. If this is so, it has probably been a soldier brought home to their family grave yard for burial.

Jeffrey Chew (grandson of Richard who settled at "Upton" in 1699) whose descendants claim it as their family burial place, had a son, Samuel Chew, killed in the Revolutionary War. (He may have been one of them.)

Other families that claim this location as their grave yard are: Marples, Zanes.

The last interment known to have been made there was of an old lady, a Mrs Hewes, her maiden name was Chew, grand-daughter of Jeffrey, this occurred during the early days of the Civil War, and is yet remembered by her grand-daughter Mrs Anne Murray of Phila., who as a little girl attended the funeral, which was brought down from Camden, the corpse being taken into the old stone house for view before the final rites.

An old draft of the farm while it was owned by Isaah M Zane shows the grave yard marked thereon as being much larger than it now appears to be. Isaah

M Zane heired the farm from his mother Mary, wife of Samuel Zane to whom it was willed by her father Isaah Marple in 1817.

...

The original old house, built long before the Revolution, of stone dug right out of the hills about, was torn down and rebuilt with the same stone on the same spot about the middle of the 1800s. Owner then was Rapp, who bought of Zellekopher and sold to Warthman Beernson, a Norwegian. ...

## The Marple-Zane Grave-Yard near Clement's Bridge.

The title-chain for this place starts on Resurvey Book H Burlington, page 241, for 200 acres to Richard Arrel, Oct 12, 1758. An unrecorded deed in the Zane family conveyed the same from Arrel to George Marple, June 18, 1760. From him it came to Isaah Marple, whose will of 1814 divided it to his three daughters. The part having the grave-yard came to his daughter Mary, wife of Samuel Zane. In the division of Zane's estate, this farm was set off to their son Isaah M Zane, June 16, 1835. (See Book B of Divisions, Surrogate's Office, Woodbury, page 396.)

The Hessian Soldiers on their return from the battle of Red Bank stopped at this farm for rest, and buried their dead in the grave-yard. Tradition says that years afterward shreds of red cloth were found there by workmen digging. Several American Soldiers were buried there also; Isaah Marple himself was one, and John Ware, who married Sarah Marple (in Old Swedes Church, Phila, in 1767) was another one. His farm is now also part of Runnemedede; where the American Legion had cared for this old spot.

## History of Wallan's Grave-Yard

On May 1<sup>st</sup>, 1700, Richard Chew bought the "Whitall Plantation" at "Upton" on the north side of the South Branch of Gloucester River (now Timber Creek), and deeded the same to his son Thomas Chew in 1723. Thomas Chew had this place resurveyed in 1740, when "one acre excepted for a grave yard" was mentioned. (See History of Upton, Page 12, Jacob Heuling deputy Surveyor.)

Recorded in Woodbury, in book of Deeds A A Page 21 is the following plan of Thomas Chew's Grave-Yard as surveyed by Christopher Sickler in 1815, who wrote that when Thomas Chew sold the farm to Joseph Smith in 1752 the grave yard was excepted, as Thomas had said that "he didn't want to sell his father," supposing therefrom that Richard the first was buried therein.

Tradition says that one of the Chew girls married a Powel and through her interest in its upkeep, it came to be known as the Powel Grave-Yard for a time. Then one of the Powel girls married a Wallens or Walling, and through care of it, Wallan or Walling Grave-Yard became its name.

The Powel family has records that Richard Powel who married Charity Chew (born 1713) bought the land adjoining the "Wallings Grave-Yard" March 3, 1763. By the will of Abraham Powel the rent helps the upkeep of the Grave-yard.

## Jesse Chew's Cemetery

Gloucester County

D F Morgan, c. 1941

On the road from Mantua to Sewell on the right hand side just before you reach the bridge over the tracks of the West jersey and Sea Shore Railway is the entrance to what used to be the farm of Joseph R Chew, a grandson of Jessie Chew. The old Chew house has been remodeled into apartments ... there is a lumber yard and an office

building for the conduct of this business. Separated from this land by the railroad tracks which run in a deep cut at this point is the stone house which originally belonged to Jesse Chew Sr. ... Passing the house and the office of the lumber company, we go back to where a little family burial plot is located. This is a square plot 82.5 feet on each side. Jesse Chew mentions this burial ground in his will and orders that the owners of this property keep the fence in repair. Later this land in which the graveyard was located descended to Joseph R Chew by will ... [the land was sold to Thomas Bee, but he deeded this area to the Chew heirs.]

In 1941 the fence had completely disappeared and there were no lines indicating the boundaries of the lot. In consequence, the owners of the property were { } with plowing, planting, etc., and there was danger of damage to the stones from animals. [The property was resurveyed, and the boundaries indicated with concrete posts. A new fence was promised.]

There are twenty-one headstones in the plot and twelve field stones indicating burials where no other markers are used. Many of the stones are broken and many are lying on the ground. The family names are Chew, Earley, Eastlack, Carpenter and one of the stones of Hannah Bugless (?) aged 10 years, the date of death being given as Sept 15, 1798. This is the oldest stone in the graveyard.

The tombstone of Rev Jesse Chew stands in the center of the row of stones facing the northwest line of the graveyard and almost twenty feet back from the line. The inscription is as follows:

In Memory of Jesse Chew minister of  
the gospel  
Who departed this life Jan 26, 1812,  
aged 76 yrs, 5 mo, 1 day.  
A man in every part  
Who lived after God's own heart  
His body in the grave to rest  
His spirit lives among the blest.

Next to Jesse Chew is the stone of his wife:

In memory of Mary Chew, wife of Jesse  
Chew  
Who departed this life May 7, 1816  
Aged 77 yrs, 5 mo, 25 da  
The pious is blest in peace to rest.
